

I was born in Monto on the 30<sup>th</sup> October 1939. I have an older sister and a younger brother and sister. At the age of three the family moved to Brisbane settling at Coopers Plains where I started school at four years of age. We then moved to Deagon for a short time where I attended Boondall state school. Our final move was to Nundah where I finished my primary schooling in 1952.

I attended high school at Industrial High that was located at the bottom of Edward Street in the city.

In 1955 I won a scholarship in Civil Engineering drafting with the Coordinator-General Department Structures Section, mostly in Bridge Design. In 1970 this section was transferred to Main Roads to form the "Special Projects" section doing plans for the Riverside Expressway. At this time I was promoted to Supervising Draftsman.

1980 saw this section amalgamated with the Bridge Branch. I was promoted to Design Office Manager, working long hours over the next ten years.

In 1990 I had a heart attack and put up my hand to take early retirement in 1992.

I had met Susan in 1960 and we married in 1963. I designed and built our house at Bracken Ridge where we lived for twenty-five years.

We have three sons and a daughter. We have four grandchildren.

My wood turning started when Susan suggested I had better find a hobby for my retirement and out from under her feet. In 1986 I joined the Qld Woodturners Society at Greenslopes. Six months later I won first prize as a novice for a pair of goblets that sold for \$40.00.

At the end of 1992 we moved to Ninderry above Yandina where I joined Cooroora Woodworkers. I served three years as President at Cooroora and was given Life Membership. During my time there I did a lot of demonstrations for various clubs all over South East Queensland. I also became an honary member of the Caloundra Club.

In 2003 we moved back towards Brisbane and settled at Narangba Valley. In 2004 I joined Bribie Woodies and now enjoy this club.

My woodturning adventure still continues. I have learnt a lot over the last thirty years and am still finding new things to do all the time as well as making new friends.

John has not mentioned he is a regular at Pyrography on a Tuesday. He is also a willing helper, as demonstrated from the above photo, helping to repair a tape measure for the B.I.C.A.C. ladies. ED.

## **Bribie Woodies and Community Gift to PNG Villagers**

Following the club's very successful community request during 2016, close to 600kg of used wood working tools and other equipment was prepared for despatch through a not-for-profit organization, "Friends of Rambutso" to Manus Province, PNG.

This project occurred as a result of a furniture making workshop in January 2016 lead by Brisbane based furniture maker, Richard Vaughan and sponsored by "Friends of Rambutso". A group of ten men from five different villages in the Rambutso Island group were taught to make furniture without the need for glue, nails or screws and were given a basic kit of woodworking tools on completing the course. They were then offered that if they continued making wooden furniture and also taught these skills to other people, additional tools would be made available at a subsequent visit.

In addition to Bribie's very generous collection, Richard tapped into his own professional network for assistance. This produced another large collection of hand tools delivered from Sydney, together with new tools to the value of \$1,000 each from Carbatec and Professional Woodworkers Supplies.

During my Navy time, I posted to HMAS Tarangau (currently Manus Island Refugee Detention Centre) and had visited an island nearby to where the tools were headed. So I got interested, asked if I could join the group as a self funded member and was accepted.

Together with founder of "Friends of Rambutso" NGO, Lynne Shori and Richard Vaughan, we flew into Manus Island on 29<sup>th</sup> of December to spend four weeks working on various projects, the largest being the building of composting toilets in the three villages on Bundrou Island in the Rambutso group, South East of Manus Island.

Bundrou Island is sand and each of the villages is only about 600mm above high water mark so septic toilets don't function and in fact pollute the fresh water table creating health issues.

After several days in Lorenrgau, the administration centre for Manus Province, we set out on New Year's Day by open boat for Bundrou Island, two plus hours away. Fortunately, the weather was ideal as, early in December with very unsavoury weather conditions, the same trip took over seven hours.

Richard and I had use of a small bungalow on the Western side of Bundrou village by the beach with brilliant sunsets while Lynne had a guest cottage on the Eastern side with views of the sunrise and surf. While the toilet project got underway, Lynne had a busy education program to introduce the concept of pedestal or sit down toilets and their successful operation to each of the three villages. I wondered why the fuss, until I experienced the pleasures of squat or "over the sea" toilets as the only option available on a daily basis – my poor knees.

The first toilet building was constructed in Bundrou village with members from all the three villages taking part. There being many competent builders available, the only assistance from us, other than providing the building plans, was teaching the assembly and installation of the composting toilet unit. As the remaining two village toilets were built, we assisted once again with the toilet unit installation. I expected we'd be working every day until the job was done. Fortunately, in the past, various Christian Missionaries had spent time on the island, such that both Saturdays and Sundays were observed as the Sabbath by someone. This allowed us time for boat trips to visit other islands and villages, plus several enjoyable fishing trips.

A celebration for the gift of the donated tools was the highlight to the last week of our visit. Four villages in the ward each received equal shares, with custody going to a village member who would store, maintain and lend out the tools for use in his community.

A councillor spoke of the magnitude of the gift and pointed out that the ward council had an annual budget of only about AU \$4,500 from which the four villages could apply for grants for essential works. He then said that the value of these gifted tools which they had just received exceeded AU \$14,000 and they had been given with no effort needed to obtain them.

The range of donated tools received at Woodies included many metalworking and mechanical tools beyond the needs of the villages. So, as a gesture of friendship and cooperation, Lynne negotiated

with the manager of the Vocational Training Centre in Lorengau for him to accept approximately 60kg for the Centre.

The Rambutso people who received the gift, together with the Manager of the Vocational Training Centre were all overwhelmed by the volume of tools and our generosity. They said that tools were both rare and expensive to obtain in PNG. I'm very grateful to have been able to work with Lynne and Richard on Bundrou Island and experience the real PNG. We were welcomed and drawn into the community by generous and loving people. Contributed by Des Wirges.

## Kim's Krafty Korner Tip

#### **Mobile Clamp Rack**

During a glue-up, the last thing I need is to go hunting for clamps. The clamp cart you see here keeps my clamps organised and nearby. It couldn't be easier to make with construction-grade stock, plywood and some simple hardware. The best part is, it can be customised to store a variety of styles and lengths of clamps.


The drawings show you all the details. I started by building the base that also serves as a tray to provide additional storage. I used a dado blade to cut a groove in the 90x38mm studs to house the tongue of the plywood bottom (detail 'd'). To complete the base and make the cart mobile, I attached four casters to the underside.


Now you're ready to get started on the A-frame rack that forms the main supporting structure for the clamp cart. I bevelled each end of four studs to fit into the tray and form the uprights of the A-frame. A trip to the drill press takes care of the holes that support the metal conduit I used as clamp hangers.

Coach bolts, washers and hex nuts secure the uprights into the base tray. I cut plywood to create gussets that reinforce the top of the frame and secured them with coach bolts as well.

Finally, you can make a handy storage tray at the top of the rack by building a shallow box. (I used plywood strips). Then, simply screw the box to the top of the frame.

Now all you need to do is cut several lengths of conduit to fit through the uprights and arrange them to suit your clamp collection.

The photo of the boxes of donated items proves just what can be done with everyone contributing.


